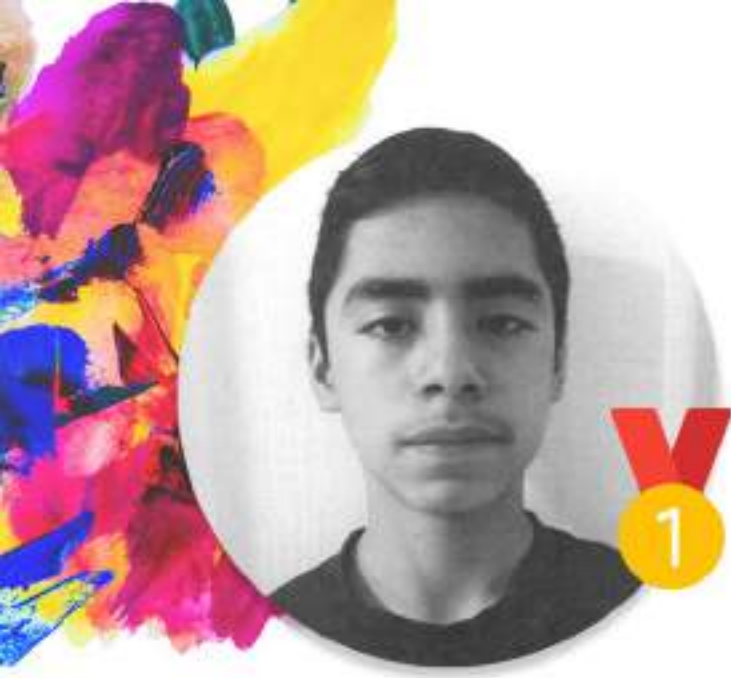

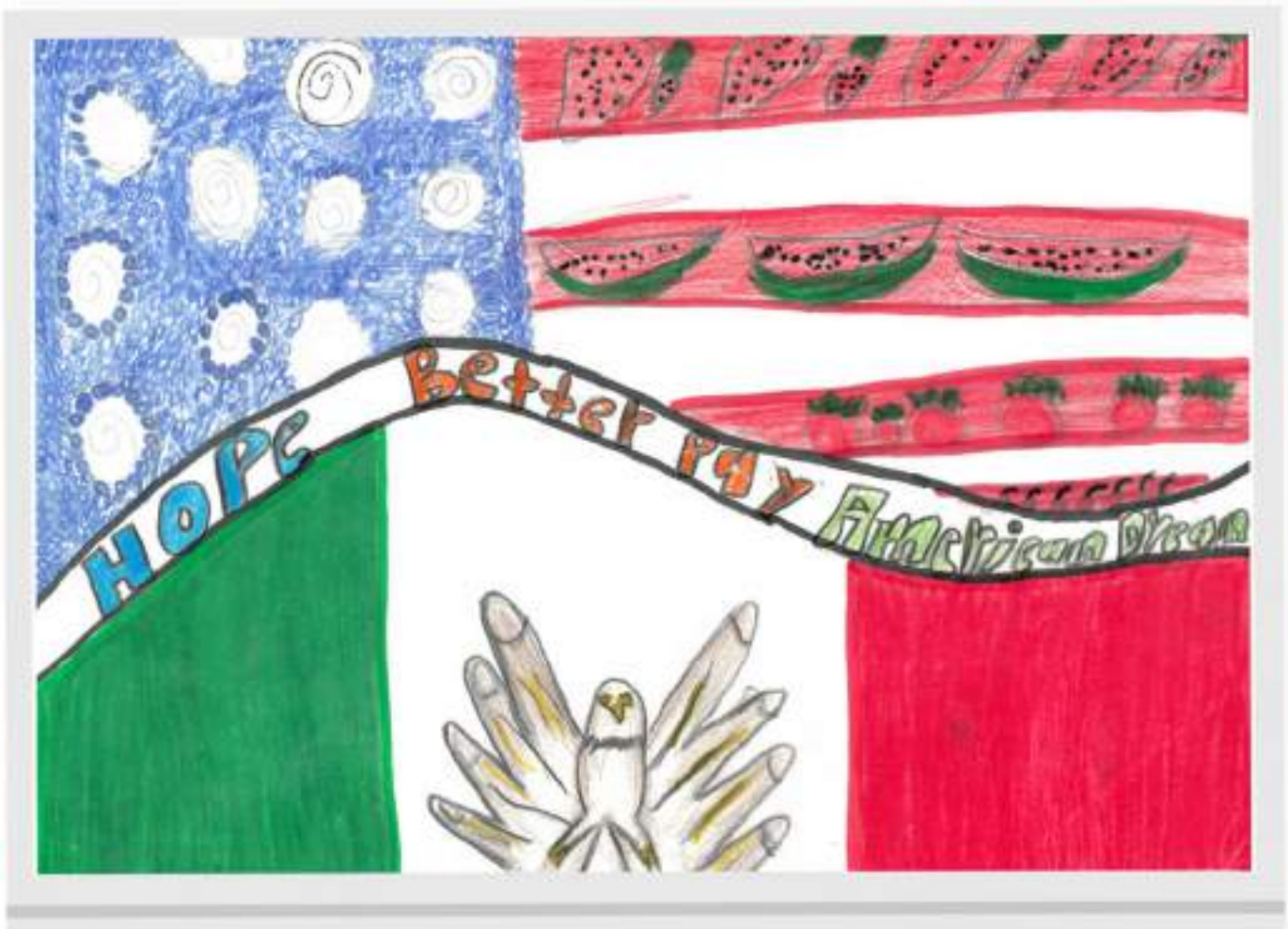
That man represents our parents putting their work in the fields, and when they look at their children, they see their children graduating from school.

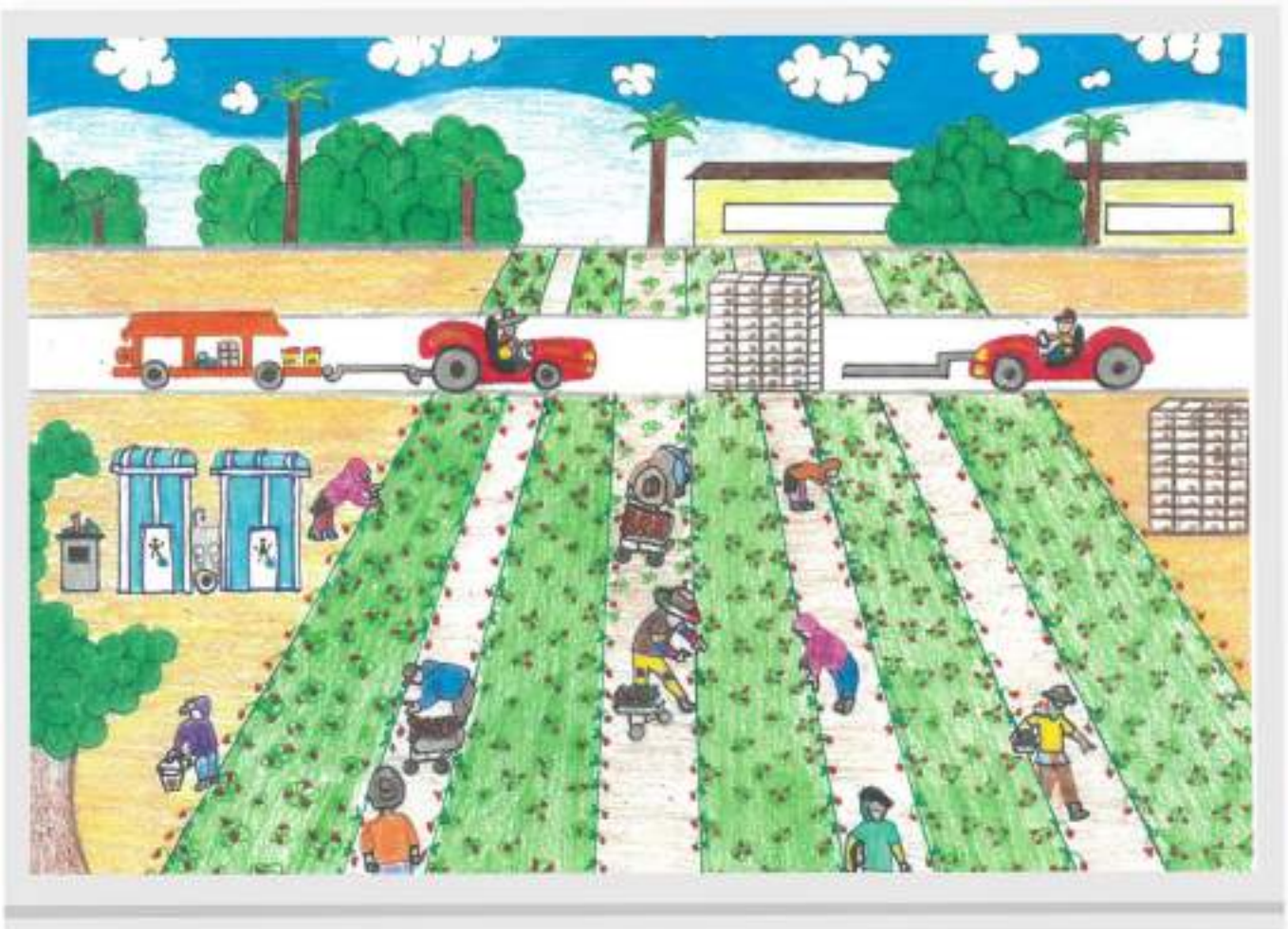

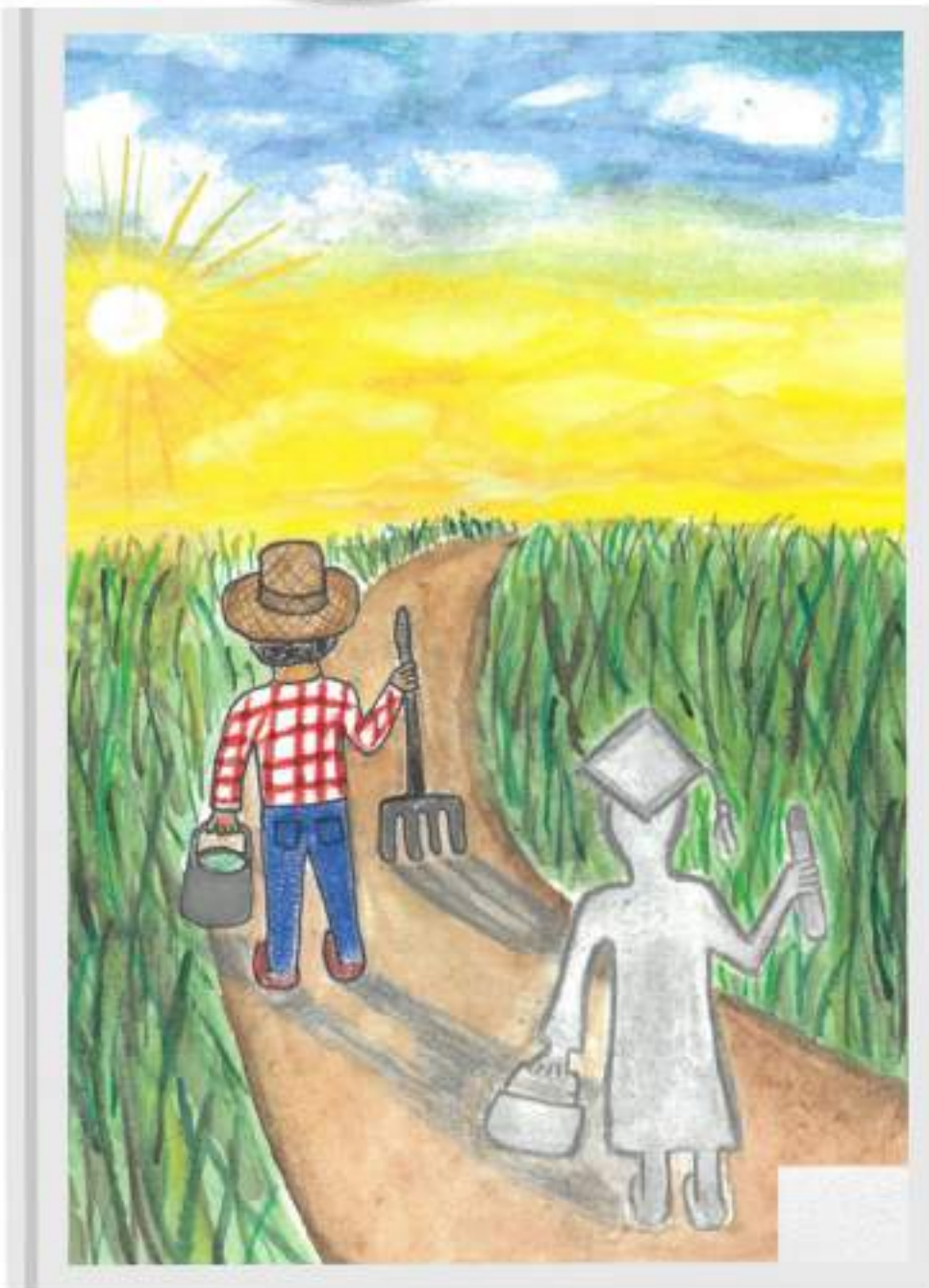


I drew the world as a clock because it represents time moving forward and the world changing.

When a farmer begins planting his harvest he has set hopes that it will flourish, that his hard work, early mornings and late nights will pay off. At the same time from a different perspective our parents live also hoping the same; an abundant apple harvest means more apple bins for que "las líneas van a estar buenas" (the lines are going to be good) and it goes on with cherries, blueberries, asparagus, peaches etc. each harvest both farmer and migrants hoping the same. Each year however, unknowingly our parents are farmers of their own. From birth they plant a seed of hope, perseverance, handwork, sacrifice, ambition and yearn to succeed in us because for them "we are the harvest of hope: we will change the world"

Over the years as I have worked with my parents harvest after harvest, at times in crisp cold weather and others in over 100 degrees, in different towns and states with varying harvest outcomes what always remains consistent is my wish to succeed. I have learned to find beauty in the life we have lived and can say I have admired the sunrise almost every day of my life, our lunch time a picnic under the trees each enjoying a burrito wrapped in tin foil and kept warm in a thermos made with handmade tortillas my mom woke up at 1 am to make. On occasions my mother speaks of how badly she wanted to be a nurse growing up, she reminisces and shares how hard she worked in school and the good student she was and in her tired eyes and rough hands from the work she has done over the years I can see the excitement as her eyes become glassy and she reminds me of the hope she has in me to continue my education, be successful and help others around me. I daydream of the day I wear my white coat and can offer services to people like myself and my parents; hardworking humble and unable to take the credit they deserve for being the essential and phenomenal farmworkers they are.

I am the one of three daughters, my parents like many others have sacrificed leaving their countries and loved ones behind in hopes of a better future for their children. As we move, begin new harvests and finish others our parents are farmers of their own sacrificing, investing, and hoping their time, love and effort will grow into successful and hardworking adults because "we are the harvest of hope: we will change the world"
